In a bizarre, back-and-forth finale, the Phillies fought off a 46-hour rain delay, lingering cold and an upstart Tampa Bay Rays squad to take the World Series in five games.

Our fans were fueled by one of the wildest crowds in Philadelphia sports history that visibly intimidated a young Tampa Bay team.

For Philly, it was more than a World Series win. It was a bit of redemption for all the losses, the jokes, the slights and the oh so close games. **Finally, something to celebrate.**

And that is certainly what Philly fans did. Moments after that final pitch, people rushed to the streets with equipped with loud bellows, booze and blunt objects. Almost like a scene from a horror movie, fans



ran to center city screaming uncontrollably and filled with Philly Passion.

Tens of thousands of fans clogged the streets of this title-starved city, celebrating the championship by climbing light poles and knocking down traffic signals, spraying beer and shooting off massive fireworks above the crowd.

Fans on foot and in cars streamed through downtown on their way to Broad Street, honking horns and cheering through sunroofs and the back of pickups.

Cars were overturned, windows were smashed, street signs were removed and shrubbery was left in shambles.

"What truly amazes me is that these fans even ripped up the bushes!?" Said an stunned officer watching the mayhem.

Early Thursday morning, police

began trying to disperse some of the crowds gathered on the streets, in one case using their bicycles as shields to move fans away from one intersection in South Philadelphia. Riot police were also called to get fans in order at Broad and Walnut, the official epicenter the Center City Riot.

"This is the biggest party I've ever seen in my life!" said David Wahl, of Burlington, N.J., screaming into his cell phone as he described the scene to his father back home in New Jersey.

City resident Mike Orlando, 46, drank from a bottle of champagne as he joined the celebration. **"There has been an awful lot of heartache with all the teams here,"** Orlando said.

"The city needed this, big-time."
